
"We are a community of believers who walk together as one. We help and encourage each other along the way as we walk side by side."

Finally!



On April 30, 2013, Bishop Murry approved our permission to spend for renovations to our Schwartz Center, Church and parking lots. On April 5, 2013, Father Matthew and parishioner, Dennis Clunk began touring elevators in various buildings around Alliance and Canton. They wanted to talk to the users of these elevators and find out how reliable their units were, how quickly a maintenance team responded to repairs and the cost effectiveness of their respective elevator. After talking with other elevator companies and the people who use them, it was determined that our original elevator plans needed to be amended. While the blueprints were being revised by Peter Paino, we began the other major renovations. The following is a list of projects completed since the spring of 2013.

- ♦ Energy efficient air conditioning units were installed in every room in the Schwartz Center and St. Dominic Chapel by Hill's Heating & Cooling
- ◆ A new roof was placed on the Schwartz Center and St. Dominic Chapel by **Skillet** Siding & Home Repair
- Joe Reese of Elite Remodeling & Construction installed new window in the Schwartz Center.
- Southway of Canton installed our new courtyard fence.



- ◆ Carnation Security installed a security system in the church and upgraded video surveillance around our property.
- ◆ The Eucharistic Tabernacle was moved to the center of the altar. This project was the combined effort of Joe Reese, Dan Skivolocke and Frank Popovich. The church sanctuary received a much needed facelift with the installation of new carpet, wood baseboards, and a beautiful tabernacle altar hand crafted by Frank Popovich.
- Soltis Electric installed energy efficient lights in every room of the Schwartz Center and updated the electrical boxes in both the Church and Finnigan Hall.
- To accommodate our growing parish, a cement parking area was added to our property by England & Sons of Atwater.
- Our Church Parking lot was sealed and restriped by Jody Vinton of Vinton Asphalt.
- ♦ **Jim Menegay of JC Masonry** repaired the brick wall around the church and replaced the bell tower windows that were broken and damaged.

This brings us to our final project.....the elevator! The final blueprints were dropped off to the City of Alliance for approval on October 30, 2013. We received elevator bids from companies in Stark County for several months. After numerous meetings with the Parish Council and Advisory Board, we contracted with Tristate Elevator to install the elevator. We had the elevator company, now we had to build the elevator shaft. Dennis Clunk met with several of our parishioners who own construction businesses and formed an elevator "dream team".

- Todd Mastroianni of Alliance Ventures is the general contractor for this project.
- ♦ Marty Pagnucco of Pag's Excavation Inc., is completing the excavating and digging for the elevator shaft.
- ◆ Jim Menegay of JC Masonry Construction is laying the cement block and masonry work for the elevator shaft and building surrounding the elevator.
- ◆ Joe Reese of Elite Flooring will also be contributing to this project as construction progresses.

The installation of the Schwartz Center elevator marks an end of our major renovations. These projects were accomplished through the stewardship of time, talent and treasure of our parishioners and the faithful business owners in Stark County.

Relics of St. John Paul II:

Last year, Father Matthew had the privilege of meeting with Archbishop the Poland. Krakow, Cardinal Stanislaw Dziwisz during the 24th Polish American Priest's Convocation. Cardinal Dziwisz was the personal secretary to St. John Paul II. Fr. Matthew has known the Cardinal for over ten years. After their meeting, Fr. Matthew wrote to Cardinal Dziwisz requesting relics of St. John Paul II and received, from Rome firstclass relics, in the form of a drop of his blood. The word "relic" comes from the Latin reliquo, meaning "I leave," or "I abandon." A relic is a piece of the body of a saint, an item owned or used by the saint, or an object that has

been touched to the tomb of a saint. St. Joseph Church is one of only two churches in the state of Ohio to have such relics.

A celebratory Mass, open to all, presenting the relics to the community was held at 10:45 a.m. on Sunday, October 20, 2013 at St. Joseph Church. Bishop George Murry, participated in this very special Mass. In addition to the presentation of the relics, Fr. Matthew was officially installed as Pastor of St. Joseph Parish.

Following the Mass, a free authentic Polish dinner, cooked by Father Matthew and our Community Cooking Team, was served in the Schwartz Center. Over three hundred people attended this very special event.

Mass of Remembrance:

Thirty-two parishioners of St. Joseph Church were remembered in a very special way at the Mass of Remembrance at St. Joseph Church on October 29th. Many families and friends of our dearly departed attended this Mass. The names of the deceased were read aloud during the tolling of the bells by members of the St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry. Individual candles with the names of the departed were lit during this Mass and carnation flowers were given to all families in attendance.

St. Vincent DePaul & St. Joseph Giving Tree: In late October we began taking names from Catholics and Non-Catholics in need of help during the Christmas Season.

This past year Saint Vincent DePaul collected food and monetary donations from St. Joseph Parishioners and prepared over 100 food baskets for needy families in Alliance. Our St. Joseph Giving Trees went up on the first Sunday of Advent. Over 100 cards with names of children from Alliance were represented on this tree. All of the tags were spoken for within the first weekend and thanks to the generosity of our parish, many children enjoyed a Christmas filled with joy and amazement.

Christmas Eve at St. Joseph Church: Our young children did not disappoint this year at the annual Christmas Eve Children's Play. Children from our PSR class took on roles of Mary, Joseph, Angels and the Magi and touched the hearts of young and old.

Mass in celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord followed the Children's Play. Santa Claus made a visit at this Mass and surprised each child with a Teddy Bear. These bears were donated anonymously by a very generous parishioner.

Lent-Holy Week-Easter: As in years past, the Stations of the Cross were held every Friday at 12:10 p.m. This year we welcomed over fifty people weekly for these very special services.

Holy week began with our Passion Cantata & Candlelight Service on Wednesday, April 16th. Our St. Joseph Choir, under the direction of **Bruce Snyder**, did a wonderful job preparing the music for this event. Our attendance at the Cantata has grown over the past three years. This year we welcomed over 200 people.

We began the Holy Triduum with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday, April 17th in remembrance of the actions of Jesus when, at the Last Supper, when He humbled Himself by washing the feet of His disciples, Father Matthew washed the feet of twelve members of our parish. In accordance with our Catholic Tradition, at the end of this Mass, the Church is stripped of its ornaments; the altar stripped bare, and the door of the

empty tabernacle is left open as if in mourning. Fr. Matthew added another element to Holy Thursday this year that touched the heart of many in attendance. After the altar was stripped bare, the lights were dimmed and the Christ in Repose statue was processed solemnly down the center aisle of the Church by pall bearers from Sharer, Stirling, Skivolocke Funeral Home. The statue was then placed at the foot of the Altar where it remained for Good Friday Services. Many who stayed after Mass to pray said they felt as if they had attended Christ's funeral and expressed how their hearts had been touched by the experience.

At 3 p.m. on Friday, April 18th a Good Friday Service took place wherein the entire Church fixed their gaze on the Cross at Calvary. On Good Friday, each member of the Church tries to understand at what cost Christ has won our redemption. In the solemn ceremonies of Good Friday, in the Adoration of the Cross, in the chanting of the "Reproaches," in the reading of the Passion and in receiving the pre-consecrated Host, we unite ourselves to our Savior, and we contemplate our own death to sin in the Death of our Lord.

At noon on Saturday, April 19th, Father Matthew blessed Easter Baskets. In Poland, blessing of the baskets is known as *swiecenie pokarmow wielkanocnych*, a practice dating to the 15th century.

On Saturday, April 19th we celebrated the Easter vigil. The Easter vigil liturgy is most-beautiful liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church and is also when we welcome new Catholics into our parish family. This year welcomed five new members to the Catholic Faith: Jason Green, Nicole Quiles, Jason Ott, John Eberling and Danielle Murphy.

Parishioners and visitors filled the pews for Easter Sunday Masses. Our church was beautifully decorated by our Liturgy Committee and parish volunteers. Thanks to all those who worked to make this year's Triduum a truly spiritual and moving experience.

















First Communion at St. Joseph Church

The one thing that sets the Catholic religion apart from other Christian denominations is our devotion to the Sacrament of the Eucharist. "The Eucharist builds the Church," as Saint Pope John Paul II said (*Redemptor Hominus 20*). It deepens unity with the Church, more fully assimilating us into Christ (1 Cor. 12:13; ccc1396)

The Holy Eucharist is the most important of the seven sacraments because, in this and no other sacrament, we receive the very body and blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ. Innumerable, precious graces come to us through the reception of Holy Communion.

When we gather for Mass, Jesus is present in the Word. Christ is present in the priest who presides over the Eucharist, but He is particularly present in the bread and wine, which, after the consecration, become the body and blood of Jesus, through the power of the Holy Spirit. At every Mass, we are witnesses to the miracle which is transubstantiation. In the Eucharist, Jesus is present in the fullest possible way. That is why the First Communion Mass is so incredibly special.

Preparation for this most important sacrament was provided by the St. Joseph Parish School of Religion (PSR). On January 18, 2014 the children experienced the loving grace of God's forgiveness through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. On Sunday, May 4, 2014, after several months of preparation; **Hunter Bonnell, Kayden Bonnell, Neithan Dunckle, Leah Menegay, Hunter Robinson** and **Adam Zumbar** received their First Communion at St. Joseph Church.

The month of May is considered the season of the beginning of new life and for that reason, we dedicate the month of May to our Blessed Mother. A ceremonial May Crowning was celebrated prior to the First Communion Mass. **Leah Menegay** had the honor of crowning our beautiful statue of Mary.

Beginning Apologetics: How to Explain & Defend the Catholic Faith ~ by Sandy McCready, Pastoral Assistant

Late last year I had to replace the "starter" in my car. My husband had a friend....of a friend, who was a mechanic and he agreed to come to our house and change the starter in my garage and only charge me for the part. I thought to myself "What a wonderful gift from God, He truly does care about me."

My husband left for work and left me alone with the mechanic. decided to stay in the garage with this man, hold the flashlight and hand him tools when he asked for them. It was the least I could do, he was doing me a favor! While he was working, we began making small talk about the weather, our families and then he asked me what I did for a living. I told him I was a pastoral assistant for a Catholic Church. This is when the conversation took an unexpected turn, my mechanic was an atheist. He began immediately to try to disprove God and my Catholic Faith. I fought a pretty good fight but realized how difficult it was for me to articulate what I know in my heart. I know I believe, but I can't always explain in an intelligent manner, "Why" I believe. Our conversation ended on a good note. When the car started on the first try, my atheist mechanic exclaimed with a huge grin across his face, "Praise God!" He also thanked me for talking with him about my faith and I told him I would pray for him. Although our conversation ended well, I couldn't escape the feeling that I fell short as a defender of my faith.

Father Matthew happened to be studying "The New Atheism" in his doctorate class and when I confided in him what had happened we thought it would be a great idea to offer an adult faith formation series on Apologetics.

Apologetics simply means giving a reasoned explanation for your faith. A Catholic apologist charitably explains and defends Catholic doctrine using Scripture, history and common sense. Apologetics fulfills the command of St. Peter,

"Always be prepared to make a defense to anyone who calls you to account for the hope that is in you, yet do it with gentleness and reverence..."

1 Pet 3:15-16

We decided to begin with the subject of defending our Catholic Faith and if this program is well received, present "How to Answer Atheists" in the Spring.

This program will begin with an Introductory Session on Wednesday, September 10, 2014 at 6:30 p.m. in the St. Joseph Schwartz Center. At this session, we will distribute study materials explain the program. This series is open to anyone, so feel free to bring a friend. As always our sessions last approximately 90 minutes. Alliance Neighborhood Center Community Dinners

Matthew 25:35

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me. The Alliance Neighborhood Center might have closed their doors, but our area churches are still providing free meals on Tuesday evenings. Although the location has changed, the commitment is the same. When the Neighborhood Center closed this past winter, United Methodist Church graciously opened their doors to host the free weekly dinners. St. Joseph Church prepares and serves a free meal to those in need the second Tuesday of every This alliance of neighborhood churches feeds approximately 100 people a week. month. The St. Joseph Community Dinner Cooking Team has established two menus that they alternate every other month. Menu one consists of baked chicken, French fries, salad, soup and dessert. Menu two consists of pasta, meatballs, salad, soup and dessert. We also provide beverages and all the paper products for this event. The Saturday morning prior to the dinner, our cooking team meets in the Schwartz Center kitchen to make the soup, pasta sauce or chicken depending on the menu for the month. On Tuesday, prior to the dinner, the food prepared on Saturday is placed in roasters to warm up and any food that cannot be made in advance is prepared. On that same day, at noon, our maintenance team brings all the food and supplies over to United Methodist Church for the din-Our serving team arrives at United Methodist about 5 p.m. to set up for the dinner, serve and cleanup afterwards. Lucky Lottery Calendars

Our Lucky Lottery Calendar fundraiser began on Tuesday, July 1, 2014. Lottery Calendars will be sold until September 30, 2014. This major fundraiser raised \$7,030 for St. Joseph Church last



year. The lottery calendar is based on the evening drawing of Ohio's daily three-digit number. In the EVENING DRAWING, you have two chances a day, during October, November, and December, to win from at least \$50 to \$500. On Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve grand prizes of \$1000, each will be awarded. Calendars cost \$30 and are available after weekend Masses in the courtyard or at the parish office Monday through Friday from 9a.m. to 4p.m.

St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry

In 2011, Father Matthew formed the St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry. The purpose of this ministry is to provide caring support to the family members of St. Joseph parishioners who have passed away.

When a loved one dies, the families are often surrounded by concerned friends and acquaintances for the first week or so and then all of sudden they are left alone to grieve because everyone else has "moved on". The St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry works to help the family through the grieving process immediately following the death of their loved one and through the first year.

When a parishioner dies, a member of the Bereavement Ministry is called to be the first contact from our church. They meet with the family, pray with them and offer guidance in planning the funeral Mass. They help the family choose appropriate scripture readings and songs. They walk them through the Catholic Funeral Mass and help them to choose the appropriate

individuals to be pall bearers, bring up the gifts, and read scripture.

This initial contact is crucial because it lets the family know that they are not alone and that their St. Joseph Family mourns with them. This first meeting also helps Father Matthew. When he meets with the family for the first time, the funeral planning is complete. He can then focus on praying with the family and talk to them about their loved one on a more intimate level. "First Contact Person" then follows up with the family throughout the year with cards or phone calls, just to let them know that we are still here for them if they should need us and they are in our thoughts and pravers.

In November, a Mass of Remembrance is celebrated around the feast of All Soul's Day. The Bereavement Ministry helps in planning this important Mass. Prior to this Mass, letters of invitation are sent to all family members of those who died during the past year. At

this Mass, the deceased is remembered in a very special way. The names of all deceased buried through St. Joseph Church for the past year are read aloud while the "tolling of the bells," an individual candle representing their loved one is lit during a special candle ceremony, and they receive a memorial flower at the end of the Mass.

Another component of the Bereavement Ministry is our Funeral Luncheons. St. Joseph Church hosts a luncheon for the family members of the deceased in the St. Joseph Schwartz Center. Members of the Funeral Luncheon team set and decorate the tables for the funeral luncheon, serve the catered food, and cleanup afterwards.

We are seeking volunteers to join this ministry. If you feel called to serve as either a "First Contact" person or as a Funeral Luncheon server, please contact the parish office. No experience is necessary. Training will be provided.



Getting plugged into a new (or even "old") parish is easy, especially in a parish like St. Joseph where there are so many activities going on:

- 1. Why get involved? Our Baptism makes us "do-ers," not spectators in our faith. We need constantly to grow in our faith and help others. As a parish, our role is to provide those opportunities and encourage your involvement. As you become involved with your fellow parishioners, you will find the wonderful gift of community.
- 2. Do I have the time to get involved? Just as we should plan our financial giving, we should plan to tithe

- a percentage of our time to growing in our own faith and to helping others each year. Even if life gets completely out-of-hand, we encourage you to stay in touch with what is going on in the parish and be open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.
- 3. What do all these *ministries / organizations do?* On page 14 of this newsletter we have listed some of the ministries available at St. Joseph Parish and a brief description of each. - **4.** How do I pick the one for me? If you would like more information about a ministry/organization, please complete the questionnaire on page 15 and return it to the parish office. We will have a ministry coordinator contact you to answer any questions you may have and get you "Plugged In".

5. I don't have any special skills?

Most of our parish activities do not require any special skills, experience, or knowledge. We just need your interest and your energy.

- 7. I know what I want to do, but I don't see it on the list of parish ministries? If you are willing to work to make your idea into a parish ministry or activity, please call the parish office and set-up an appointment with Father Matthew to discuss your idea and how you see it could be implemented.
- 8. I'm not sure, but I think I have a calling to pursue a religious vocation? Contact the parish office to make an appointment with Father Matthew, he would be delighted to talk with you.

Ministries / Organizations at St. Joseph Parish



Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament: Adoration is a quiet time spent weekly in prayer and reflection with Jesus in the Eucharist. Commitment time is one hour per week.

Adult Altar Server: Adults who assist the celebrant at Mass, especially for Daily Mass and Funeral Masses

Adult Faith Formation Programs: Programs are offered throughout the year for adults with the sole purpose of awakening your faith. A series lasts 6-12 weeks depending on the subject. All programs are held on Wednesdays beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Bereavement Ministry: Provides a connection between the parish of St. Joseph and the bereaved and offers assistance and ongoing support to the family who has experienced loss.

<u>Bible Study:</u> Group meets Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. to discuss the coming Sunday readings.

<u>Catholics Returning Home:</u> This six week series begins the first Wednesday after Easter. The program gives a process by which Catholics who have been away from the Church can transition back "home".

Catholic Women's Club: Consists of Catholic women in Alliance. They meet monthly for the mutual advancement of its members, in spiritual, charitable, intellectual, cultural and social fields of endeavor.

Catholic Men's Fellowship: A gathering of men who discuss their lives in light of their Catholic faith and to share their faith and experiences through friendship, prayer, and fraternity.

<u>Cantor/Song Leaders</u>: A cantor or song leader leads and supports the parish in singing hymns, psalms and acclamation at Masses

<u>Cemetery Board</u>: Works with the Pastor and Parish Staff to identify areas of the building and grounds of the cemetery property in need of repair and to assure proper maintenance.

Choir: Choir meets each Wednesday at 7 p.m. to practice songs, and pray together to lead our parish family in song every Sunday.

<u>Church Cleaners:</u> A team of committed parishioners vacuum and dust the main level of the Church weekly

<u>Community Dinner Cooking Team</u>: Meets once a month to cook the Alliance Neighborhood Dinner.

<u>Community Dinner Servers:</u> Meets once a month to serve the Alliance Neighborhood Dinner.

Eucharist Minister: Assist the Priest by serving the body and blood of Christ at Mass. May also take Communion to the Homebound or Nursing Home Residents.

<u>Funtastics:</u> This "young at heart" group is open to men and women who are at least 55 years of age. They meet on a monthly basis just to have fun!

<u>Greeters:</u> Welcome parishioners and non-parishioners at the church door as they arrive for Mass or other special services.

<u>Homebound Minister</u>: Visit parishioners who are homebound or live in local nursing homes. They provide support by listening, praying and distributing Communion.

Knights of Columbus #558: The K of C Provides members with volunteer opportunities in service to Catholic parishes and the community.

<u>Lay Leader of Prayer</u>: Lay ministers preside at or lead the congregation of special groups in various services such as Novenas and Stations of the Cross.

<u>Lectors</u>: Proclaim the Word of God at Sunday/Daily Mass or other liturgical Services.

<u>Liturgy Committee</u>: Works with the Pastor to implement diocesan and universal liturgical policies, recommends and coordinates a schedule for worship services and provides appropriate environmental background in the church.

Marriage Preparation—Sponsor couple: Meet with an engaged couple to aid them in preparing for the sacrament of marriage.

<u>Parish Outreach Ministry:</u> Help parishioners with minor repairs within their home.

Parish and Family Life Committee: Plans social events for our parishioners to build community and good relationships. Some events include Lenten simple suppers, new member dinners and parish picnic.

Parish Pastoral Council: Works with the Pastor and Parish Staff to carry out the mission of the Roman Catholic Church in the parish, community, diocese and the world.

Pro-Life Ministry: Supports the Alliance Life Chain during Respect Life Sunday in October.

<u>PSR Catechist</u>: Teach and share the Word of God with students from the public schools who are members of St. Joseph Parish.

PSR Volunteers: Help the C.R.E. to provide assistance in the area of religious education to public school children.

RCIA Team: Provides Religious Education to the non-baptized or baptized adults who desire to become Catholic.

St. Vincent DePaul Society: An organization of parishioners who have accepted the important responsibility of serving people in temporary need of food, and utility payment help. They also provide Christmas baskets for those in need in the community each year in late December.

Social Activities Committee:
Organize parish fundraising events such as Mother's Day Brunch, Island Party etc.

<u>Ushers:</u> Assist parishioners and visitors in finding a place to sit at Mass, assist anyone with a special need, take up the offertory collection and direct the Communion Procession.

Wedding Coordinator: Assist Father in organizing parish weddings. **Vacation Bible School**: A one week event where children preschool through 6th grade enjoy learning about God through meaningful activities based on a daily theme.

Youth Altar Server: Young boys and girls who assist the priest at Masses on Sunday, holy Days at Funeral Masses and Weddings.

Youth Ministry Volunteer: Provide assistance, support and guidance to the Youth Ministry Staff by service as an advisor chaperone, substitute catechist and/or activity volunteer helper.
