

Losing a loved one is never easy especially if it is your wife, husband, daughter or son. When we lose someone who was so close and so dear to our heart, a part of us dies with them. Life goes on as it always does, but life without our loved one will never be the same. Wounds heal with time, as they say, but some wounds may take a bit longer to heal. In our dealings with people who are grieving and mourning the loss of a loved one, we must always remember never to rush them through their grief. We all grieve differently, and we should never put time restraints or try to "speed up" the process of grieving by encouraging those who are grieving to just "snap out of it," or "just move on and let go." > As I mentioned it in my previous articles, we are trying very hard to accomplish a few renovation projects before the first snow this year. A few weeks ago we were able to put a new roof on the Schwartz Center. Within the next few months, we would like to cement the gravel area behind the rectory and turn it into a fully operational parking lot. We are also in the process of finalizing the drawings for the elevator shaft to be installed at the Schwartz Center. This will make the Schwartz Center fully handicap accessible. We are presently in the process of installing the air conditioning system at the Schwartz Center. As many of you know, our old window air conditioning units are outdated, and not energy efficient. The proposed air conditioning system will allow us to save money on electricity in the long run, and it will also give us several different zone options so that the AC will run only in the rooms being used for different parish meetings and functions.

> Our final project this year is to replace the windows in the Schwartz Center, St. Dominic's Chapel and the Server's Sacristy in the Church. These windows are very worn, and some of them exhibit safety and security hazards. We have acquired several bids for each of the above mentioned projects, and at the recommendation of the Parish Council, Finance Council and Advisory Board and after much discussion, a







Blessed John Paul II Relics ~Submitted by Fr. Matthew Mankowski

In April of this year, I attended the 24th Polish American Priests' Convocation in Pittsburgh, PA. While there I had the privilege of meeting the former secretary to our beloved Pope John Paul II, Cardinal Stanislaw Dziwisz. Archbishop of Krakow. Poland. During Convocation, there the was much talk about the canonization of Blessed John Paul II. When I returned to Alliance, I began the process of requesting first class relics of Blessed John Paul II.

For those who do not know what we mean by

"*Relics*". the word "relic" comes from the Latin relinguo, literally meaning "I leave," or "I abandon." A relic is a piece of the body of a saint, an item owned or used by the saint, or an object which has been touched to the tomb of a saint. Traditionally, a piece of the body of a saint, especially that of a martyr, may be with the permission of the local ecclesiastical authority, used in solemn processions recalling the specific holy person. In June, we received, from Rome, a class one relic of Blessed John Paul II, a drop of his blood. The presentation to the parish of the relics is on

October Sunday, 20. 2013 at 10:45 a.m. mass. We have invited Bishop George Murry to participate in this celebration. There is a very good chance that Blessed John Paul II will be canonized as a saint in April of next year. We will be only one of two churches in the State of Ohio to have first class relics, and that is cause for great celebration within our church. Please mark October 20th on vour calendars! I'm looking forward to celebrating this monumental event with you.

Renovation Projects ~ Submitted by Fr. Matthew Mankowski

For the past year, I was weekly asked the following questions: Will we ever get started on these renovations? When will these renovations be done?

On September 12, 2012 we sent a Permission to Spend request to the Diocese of Youngstown asking for permission to access St. Joseph Church funds to start our renovation projects. For those of you who did not know, all parishes must send a request to the Bishop if they are to spend over \$10,000. With this report, we submit a financial statement, all estimates for work and a letter explaining, in detail, the work that is to be done. Until the permission to spend is approved by the Bishop, we are not able to start any renovations.

Seven months later, on April 30, 2013 we received the approval of Bishop Murry to precede with our renovations.

At the end of July, Hill's

Heating and Cooling of Alliance, sent electricians to complete the electrical work needed to install the air conditioning units at the St. Joseph Schwartz Center. The air conditioning work has begun and should be complete late September.

On August 7th, **Jeff Keene**, of Skilet Siding & Home **Repair**, replaced the roof on the Schwartz Center. This work was completed within two days despite the rainy weather!

We have selected a company to install the elevator for the Schwartz Center, and all we are waiting for is the final approval of the architectural drawings.

We have also selected a company to install the parking lot where the gravel overflow lot is now. We are just waiting for the company to begin work.

We will be contracting with **Joe Reese**, of **Elite Remodeling and Construction**, of Alliance to replace the windows in the Schwartz Center. We are on

their work schedule list and hopefully, we will be able to replace the windows before the winter months begin.

Over the summer, we completed many improvements around the church grounds. As you may have noticed, **Southway** of Canton installed new fencing and entry gates in our courtyard. The new gates allows easier access to the church during the day for prayer and additional security at night.

Our St. Joseph Church maintenance team: Dave Skolosh, Mike Johnson, Howard Henderson and Andrew Gallina have kept busy this summer beautifying our Cemetery, leveling grave markers, repairing and painting all of the main doors to the church and Schwartz Center. trimming trees. mulching and making the buildings & grounds look more pleasing to the eye. Our guys have also been stripping floors in the church,

Schwartz Center and PSR classrooms to ready the rooms for the new school year!

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states the tabernacle is to be in the situated most worthy place, with the greatest of honor. For this reason, Joe Reese Skivolocke Dan and Frank Popovich joined forces to build a small altar, located under the crucifix on which to place our Eucharistic tabernacle. This will move the Blessed Sacrament to the center of the altar where it rightfully should be. This project should be completed mid September.

We see the light at the end of the tunnel, and we are working hard to get these projects done in a safe and timely manner.

The St. Joseph Parish School of Religion (PSR) serves grades Pre-K - 12. We provide religious education opportunities for the youth and families of St. Joseph Church to enhance their personal and community faith development. In addition to religious education, we offer preparation classes for the sacraments of First Reconciliation, First Communion and Confirmation. We also have a Youth Ministry program and offer opportunities other for enriching the faith of our young people. Our dedicated volunteers serve as catechists, substitute teachers, youth group leaders and chaperones, teaching assistants and helpers with unique programs. The Parish School of Religion begins in September and continues through the first Sunday of May. Classes are held on Sundays from 9:00 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. in the St. Joseph Schwartz

Center.

2013 Confirmation: In order for area parishes to celebrate the sacrament of confirmation near home, the Diocese of Youngstown mandates that area parishes completed service hours in our church, as well as, our community, attended group meetings and religious education classes and attended a special retreat presented by Beacon Street Productions. The Holy Triduum and Easter Sunday

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Although chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

We began Holy Week with the presentation of *"The Passion Cantata and Candlelight Service"* on Wednesday, March 27th. Our St. Joseph Choir, under the direction of **Mr. Bruce Snyder**, did a wonderful job preparing the music for this event. We are excited to report that we had about 150 people attend this special service.

We began the Holy Triduum with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday, March 28th at 7 p.m. Consecrated and blessed Holy Oils, which were received from the St. Chrism Mass at Columba Cathedral earlier in the week. were presented to the parish. In remembrance of the actions of Jesus when, at the Last Supper, He humbled Himself bv washing the feet of His disciples, Father Matthew washed the feet of twelve members of our parish. It is during this Mass that



the Church is stripped of its ornaments; the altar stripped bare, and the door of the empty tabemacle is left open as if in mourning.

At 3 p.m. on March Good 29th a Friday Service took place wherein the entire Church fixed their gaze on the Cross at Calvary. On Good Friday, each member of the Church tries to understand at what cost Christ has won our redemption. In the ceremonies of solemn Good Friday, in the Adoration of the Cross, in the chanting of the 'Reproaches', in the reading of the Passion, and in receiving the pre-consecrated Host, we unite ourselves to our Savior, and we contemplate our own death to sin in the Death of our Lord.



At noon on Saturday. March 30th. Father Matthew blessed Easter which Baskets is а European custom. In Poland, blessing of the baskets is known as swiecenie pokarmow wielkanocnvch. a practice dating to the 15th century. The food items in the Easter basket have special significance. The white napkin that lines the basket represents the shroud of Christ. The lamb in butter, sugar dough, wood or even plastic stands for Jesus, the Paschal lamb. The hard-cooked eggs symbolize new life or Christ rising from his tomb. Bread represents the bread of life given by God. Meat and sausages are symbols of the resurrected Christ; horseradish represents accepting the bitter with the sweet in life; vinegar symbolizes the sour wine given to Jesus on the cross. Salt is to add zest to life and preserve us from corruption, and sweets suggest the promise of eternal life or good things to come

On Saturday, March 30th, we celebrated the Easter Vigil. The Easter Vigil liturgy is the most beautiful liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church and is also when we welcome new Catholics into our parish family. This year we welcomed five members to the new Catholic Faith: Judy Wittensolder, David McMaster, Audrey McClellan, Bill Fast and John McMaster. These five individuals were actively involved in the RCIA process which began in August of 2012.

The church was filled for Easter Sunday Masses and was beautifully decorated by our Liturgy Committee and parish volunteers.

Thanks to all those who worked to make this year's Triduum a truly spiritual and moving experience.



Are **you** considering becoming Catholic? Are *you* a Catholic interested in being Confirmed? Are *YOU* a confirmed Catholic who's ready to explore your faith anew?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, then RCIA is for you! Every year men and women embark on an exploration of the Catholic faith. Some are deciding if they are called into the Catholic Church; others have been Catholic all their lives and are now interested in discovering what this really means. Together we witness to the fact that our search for God is a lifelong journey, a journey on which we make the most progress when we walk with others.

This year St. Joseph Church all RCIA sessions will be held at the St. Joseph Schwartz Center and will begin at 12:00 p.m. with a light lunch and will end at about 2:00 p.m. We plan on having two sessions a month beginning August 18th and continuing until the Easter Vigil, April 19, 2014.

We have revamped our previous program to include the "Catholicism Series" by Fr. Robert Barron and the "What Catholics Believe" series. We feel the changes we have made to the program will better enable us to guide our participants on their spiritual journey.

The RCIA process is not just open to those who want to become Catholic; it is open to anyone who wants to learn more about the Catholic faith. Many of us stopped learning about our Catholic faith when we received the Sacrament of Confirmation in our early teens. It's not uncommon for us to realize as adults that we want to know more about our faith. RCIA is an opportunity for you to explore your faith. It is also a chance to see your faith through the eyes of people exploring it for the first time. Together we'll help each other grow closer to Jesus Christ.

Our Holy Father Pope Francis stated "All of the baptized must announce Jesus with our life, with our witness and with our words. When we do this, the church becomes a mother church that bears children. But when we don't do it, the church becomes not a mother, but a baby sitter church. which takes care of the child to put him to sleep." If you are searching for a way to get involved in the "New Evangelization" of the Catholic Church, the RCIA process may be your answer.

WHAT IS PERPETUAL ADORATION? Perpetual Adoration is a Eucharistic devotion whereby members of St. Joseph Parish unite in taking hours of adoration before the Most Blessed Sacrament during the day and throughout the night, from Mondays at 9 a.m. through Thursdays a midnight. HOW DOES ONE SPEND AN HOUR BEFORE JESUS EXPOSED IN THE BLESSED SACRAMENT? This hour Jesus wants you to spend with Him is spent any way you want. You may bring your own prayer books, use the books in the chapel, read the Bible, pray the rosary, or just sit and relax and enjoy the sweet peace that comes from simply being in the Presence of God. You may feel that you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The mere fact that you take the time,

at a specific hour each week to spend 60 minutes with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament pleases Him very much and is in itself a prayer of great faith. Please remember that Perpetual Adoration is not just for a day, a week, a month, or a year. Rather, it is for always. It is not temporary, but ongoing, lasting, permanent.


